Governor John David Waihee III

(b. 1946)

Born in Honoka`a on the island of Hawai`i, John Waihee became part of a new generation of activist Hawaiians who fought for political and cultural recognition in the 1970s and 80s. Waihee was educated at Andrews University and Central Michigan University, later earning



his law degree as a member of the first graduating class of the University of Hawaii's Law School in 1976.

In <u>1978</u>, Waihee was a delegate to the Hawai`i State Constitutional Convention and helped establish the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA). In <u>1980</u>, he won office as a state representative and in <u>1982</u>, he became lieutenant governor. In <u>1986</u>, he followed <u>Ariyoshi</u> as governor, serving two terms. Waihee was the first state governor of Hawaiian ancestry; Samuel King had been the only Hawaiian territorial governor. During Waihee's time in office, Hawai`i enjoyed economic boom years and Waihee established a friendly and productive relationship with Governor (then President) Bill Clinton.

Since the end of his governorship in <u>1994</u>, Waihee has worked as a lobbyist for Verner, Liipfert, Bernhard, McPherson & Hand in Washington, D.C. In <u>1999</u>, he was also appointed head of the American Samoa Economic Advisory Commission.
